

Friends of the Red Church

As a charitable group we have had a busy few months, from new appointments to the completion of planned projects and unfortunately vandalism on site.

As the new Secretary of Friends of the Red Church, I am looking forward to guiding us through maintenance of the site, improving our knowledge of its history and stories of those baptised and buried there. It's an important asset and attraction of the town. Why not join us on Facebook and Instagram for updates.

Judy Moore has been involved in applying for funding for an information board, and we are excited and thankful to have been awarded funding from Broseley Town Council and the Shropshire Family History Society for this. This way we can promote the history and importance of the Red Church on site and allow visitors to have a more engaging experience. We currently have a small exhibition at the Chapel in Broseley cemetery, why not call in and have a look at the story of the red church. Steve Dewhirst has added to our understanding of the story of the church by highlighting the foundations. Steve has also completed the QR-Code self-guided tour of the site; you can use the QR codes on mobile devices to access online information about the Church and people.

John Storar has been fantastic maintaining the churchyard, keeping it looking respectful and safer to walk around.

I will briefly mention the unfortunate criminal damage that has happened on site in September. A police report was made, the damaged bird nest boxes disposed of and signs put back. The broken slabs are a nuisance as they were due to be used for defining the foundations after recording. However, this incident is just a footnote in the history of the site, and we have had fantastic support from the community of donations towards new nest boxes which are being collected at Broseley Library. I would like to give special mention to CJ Wildlife for their very kind donation of a nest box. If you would like to build a nest box, free instructions are available on the RSPB website.

Broseley Pipeworks by Ian West

Members will know that Broseley Pipeworks Museum has remained shut through 2025, due to financial constraints at the Ironbridge Gorge Museums. However, it was opened for free for two days over the weekend of 13-14 September, as part of the national Heritage Open Days (HOD) scheme, led by the National Trust.

Over the two days, the Pipeworks attracted 425 visitors, which is far more than for any previous HOD event at the site. It is also around half the number of paying visitors the Pipeworks attracted throughout the whole of 2024. Of the weekend's visitors, 72% were from Shropshire, (29% from Ironbridge or Broseley), but some from as far away as USA and Canada. Most people (77%) had not visited the Pipeworks before. Feedback forms were completed by 162 visitors, 143 of whom gave a 10/10 enjoyment score. The average score was 9.81.

Broseley Town Council remain keen to take over managing the opening of the Pipeworks for visitors in 2026, but discussions with IGMT have not progressed very quickly. If this proposal comes to fruition, it is hoped that the site would be open for more days than in recent years, which will require more volunteers than are currently on the books. Watch out for more news about recruitment over the winter.

RUNAWAY HUSBAND – TWO GUINEAS REWARD by Janet Doody

Where as THOMAS LLOYD of Canal Buildings in the parish of St. Mary, Shrewsbury, collier, hath left his wife and family chargeable to the said parish: Whosoever will give information that will lead to his apprehension, shall receive Two Guineas Reward upon application to the Parish Officers of St. Mary's aforesaid.

The said Thomas Lloyd absconded on the 14th August last, and then had on a short Flannel Smock Frock and Duck Trowsers [sic]; he is upwards of 50 years of age, stands 5ft 5 or 6 inches high, with light complexion – He has been working as a collier and labourer at Madeley, Madeley Wood Bank, Dawley, Wolverhampton, Bilston and other parts of Shropshire and Staffordshire for above 30 years; and for the last two years has been working at Messrs. Benyon's Factory in Shrewsbury – He is well known in the neighbourhood of Madeley Wood.


This is all about money! The important reference being 'left his wife and family chargeable to the said parish'; the Parish Officers, on behalf of the parish tax payers sought recompense! I wonder if he was ever found!

CHURCH ARMY VANS by Janet Doody

From the late 1890's to around WW2 Church Army Vans were despatched to rural parishes on evangelical missions. The 'officers' would stay a short time and hold services, often outdoors, or in schools and village halls or 'mission rooms'. The illustrated card is in remembrance of a visit to Buildwas Parish in December 1902; unfortunately there is no newspaper report of this particular visit but there are records of numerous similar ones in many Shropshire parish. Most say how successful they are with good attendances at services but not all:

The Church Army Van being now located at Broseley in charge of "Captain" Humphrey and "Cadet" Helms; a brief service was held in Broseley Wood School on Tuesday evening The Rector, Rev. G. F. Lamb was present and at the close pronounced the Benediction. There was a poor attendance owing doubtless to the unpropitious state of the weather

The Memorial Green at the Delph Broseley by Steve Dewhirst

The word delph derives from the Old English Delf, meaning a quarry, pit, mine or hole.

In Broseley¹, the first mention of the name is in 1554 during the reign of Mary Tudor, when William Adams had a pit called a coal Delph in Broseley. The coal measures in this part of the town are close to the surface, and a seam of coal can be seen in the cellar of the old Pheasant Pub on Church Street. Parsons's 1621 map of Broseley does not show the Delph, but it was located in an unenclosed area marked ColePitt Hill². A later map of 1658 shows one pool on Coalpit Hill³. The first detailed survey was for the Broseley Estate in 1728, which shows two pools, the upper one feeding into the lower one.

The two Delphs were surveyed in more detail in 1764: 'The two Delphs or Delves are said to be were Coal has been formerly got and since then have been made into fish ponds, the Lower is now made use of for that purpose, the Upper is let dry, converted into a yard and let to Mr Francis Wilde for five shillings a year. Since then, large quantities of Earth, Clay &c have been wheeled into them, so at this time they are not more than one Rood and seven Perch each... the land on which the Market House stands, with that adjoining viz CDE is fifteen Perch.'

As Broseley expanded, the Delph became an open cesspit. Together with the Down Well, it was said to have been the main supply of water, but in the 1860s it was said that: 'The Delph only received the rainwater from the street and the sewage from surrounding houses; consequently, in a time of drought it conveyed no agreeable sensation either through the optic or olfactory nerves.'4 In 1861, a meeting was called to discuss filling in the Delph, which described it as a 'stagnant, filthy pool, which has long been a public nuisance, and which on sanitary grounds ought to be removed.' At that time, one newspaper speculated, incorrectly, that it was where 'delf ware' . In June 1861, the Delph was filled in⁶. It appears that the wall and railings were put up around this time, as in 1863, there was discussion of extending them around the Pritchard Memorial, which had been erected in 1862'.

Having been filled in, the lower delph became known as the Memorial Green, presumably named after the adjacent Pritchard Memorial. The wall and railings may have been erected at the same time as the Pritchard memorial, as in 1863 it was reported that at the end of the delph enclosure adjoining the memorial is to be taken down, it would seem that the walls and railing are to be extended so as to include the building. "Truly it is a great pity that the centre of the little park-like enclosure now representing the filthy muddy Delph was not chosen as the site of the memorial."

The railings around the Delph were erected by 1879⁹. In 1868, the Broseley, Benthall, Barrow, Linley and Willey Cottage Garden Allotment Society held their seventh annual exhibition of flowers, fruits and vegetables in a tent on the Memorial Green. This event had previously been held in the Town Hall¹⁰. It was also used for concerts by Maws Benthall Works Brass Band and Jackfield Brass Band¹¹, fireworks after a sports day, and dancing after a Horticultural show¹². In 1905, it was used for the Broseley Fanciers Show of poultry pigeons, rabbits, cage birds, cats and cavies when a marquee was erected.

The Victoria Institute was formed in 1905, opening the hall as a club for the 'artisan class', taking over the hall previously used by the Plymouth Brethren. They appear to have taken over responsibility for the memorial green and used part of it as a bowling green, and it became known as the Victoria Memorial Green. When the Coal strike ended in 1912, a ceremony was held on the green to thank Lord Forester for allowing people to dig for coal at the Foxholes in Benthall¹³.

Nearby is the Memorial Green (or town garden), which is also under the control of the Council, chiefly through the efforts of the Rector, Rev. C. S. Jackson, M.A.; this has been well kept and admired by many. On the same site stands the War Memorial, erected by public subscription, at £553 15s. 2d.; it was unveiled by the late Lord Forester on March 20th, 1921. After all payments were made, a balance remained of £14 16s., which was given to Shirlett Sanatorium

In 1921, it was proposed to site some public conveniences on the green. In 1933, Mr Shorting purchased three seats for the green. There had been some railings surrounding the war memorial, which were removed in the same year and used as fencing around a newly created garden near the Broseley Wood Mission Hall. During the Second World War, scrap was requisitioned by removing cast iron railings around many parks and squares in Britain, with Lord Beaverbrook saying, 'We will turn your pots and pans into Spitfires and Hurricanes, Blenheims and Wellingtons.' It seems likely that the one around the Delph was removed at this time.

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
