Not to be confused with the Madeley Wood Companies brickworks at Bedlam and Blists Hill this brickyard was located near Madeley Wood Green (SJ6790 0373) adjacent to Madeley Bank which was a turnpike road constructed between 1806. It was said to have been founded around 1716 but there are no records of the works until the early 1800s.¹

Originally part of the Madeley Estate in 1786 John Onions Snr. of Benthall purchased land from John Morris & Elizabeth his wife and Thoams Fletcher for £580 which comprised Great Willow through the Little Willow through and Dingle Leasow continuing an estimated 14 acres. This had been sublet in 1784 to Robert and George Ward for 11 years and was described as a meadow and pasture with a stable and other buildings. In 1802 Onions purchased 3 acres 3 roods and 17 perches of adjacent land called Clifton's Piece from Francis Phillips of Brockton, Gent, William Purton of Madeley Court, Gent and Willaim Benbow of Broseley, Gent for £300. It had been in the occupation of Willaim Purton and included houses &c. The Lord of the Manor had the liberty of hawking hunting and fowling & also all mines of coal ironstone & minerals whatsoever.² It seems strange that Onions, who was an iron and coal master with interests in Benthall and Broseley, should purchase 18 acres of land in Madeley. Fortunately for him, the lord of the manor did not have the rights to the clay and sand so when the brickworks were founded, they could be extracted free of royalty. The records of sale make no mention of clay extraction or brick and tile manufacture, so it seems likely that these did not start until after Onions purchased the land in 1786 throwing some doubt on the validity of the early 1700s date claimed by Davis.

In 1813 there is a reference to Thomas Davis and Thomas Rickus brickmakers at Madeley and the next year W. Morris a brickmaker and builder of Madeley Wood was declared bankrupt.³ In 1820 John Davis was baptised his father being George who was listed as a brickmaker. In 1822 Gorge and Thomas Davis left the partnership in the firm of the Woodlands Brick and Tile company leaving Samuel and Willam Smith to run the works along with Charles Lumley.⁴ It seems likely that this is the same Davis family who were to operate the Madeley Wood Works. The lease for land at Madeley Wood was in November 1824 so as the normal lease period was 25 years the works may have been run by them since 1803 if not before. However, they may have taken it on after leaving the Woodlands Works two years earlier. The lease was to George Davis of Madeley and Thomas Davis of Broseley Brickmakers with authority to build and erect kilns buildings etc on the pieces of land listed. They also had the liberty to use the clay and sand pits already made and the royalties for bricks being 1s and tiles 1½ d per 1000 (see Appendix 1). There is no mention of an existing brickworks but as one of the parcels of land is called Bricklin Pices one must have already existed however it is possible there were no permanent buildings on the land. A valuation of the estate of John Onions around this time lists a Brickkiln and about 2 acres let to Messrs Davies (sic) at a rent of £76.⁵

Pigott's directory of 1822 lists Thomas Davies of Broseley under Brick and Tile Makers with Robert Palmer as the only person with this occupation at Madeley Wood. In 1828 the directory lists both George and Thomas Davies of Broseley, but Plamer was no longer listed. The 1835 edition lists George Davies of Madeley Wood so it is possible that the Thomas and George listed in previous editions were the same people and that Thomas had either left the partnership or died. George (1780-1851) had two sons George Jnr. (1817-1871) and John (1820-1893?) who both became involved in brickmaking. It is possible that John took over the Tweedale Brick and Tile works in 1846 which he renamed Halesfield. These operated until at least 1853 but had been demolished by 1881.

In 1845 the partnership of George and John Davis of Ironbridge and Madeley Wood, brick and tile manufacturers and barge owners dissolved. We do not know if this was George Snr. or George Jnr and which of the partners left. The lease was renewed in 1849 for a further 21 to George Jnr and John Davis.⁶




Figure 1. Plan from 1849 Lease (SA 1190/4/352). Shows two Beehive kilns. The trackway through lots 12 and 13 is shown as a tramway leading on the Tithe map leading to a clay quarry.

The 1851 census lists George (34) as a widower living at Madeley Wood Green with his daughter Prudence (6) and a servant. His occupation was as a Brick and Tile manufacturer. George was living at Lincoln Hill when he died in 1855 and his wife Sarah inherited his share of the works.⁷ She remarried and died in 1865. John Davis continued to run the business and in 1856 opened a yard on a wharf on the Shropshire Union Canal near the Goods Station where he sold Broseley Brick, tiles etc.⁸ Business must have been good as three years later was advertising for 20 to 30 brickmakers.⁹

By 1858 Elizabeth the wife of John Davis died and by this time, as well as operating the brickworks, he was also farming at Nedge Farm near Shifnal.¹⁰ In 1871 he was still at the farm which comprised 110 acres and he was employing 3 men and 1 boy. He listed himself as a farmer with no mention of brickmaking. He left Nedge farm in 1873 when he was said to be 'removing to a distance'.¹¹

By 1867 when he let the Heart of Oak Inn on Court Lane, Madeley John's son Edward John was a partner in the Brick and Tile, Works.¹² Slater's directory in 1868 and Bagshaw's in 1869 lists Davis & Son (Broseley brick & tiles) Ironbridge.

On the death of John Onions Jnr. in 1859 his estate was managed by trustees on behalf of his daughters. In 1868, with the lease on the Madeley Works due to expire they decided to have the brickyard valued.¹³ The next year they had another valuation with the brickworks and 9 acres of land were valued at £1593 and the remaining 9 acres of land at £1829.¹⁴ Edward John Davis must have intended to purchase the works as sometime in 1870 a draft conveyance was drawn up with a sale price of £750. This is less than the valuation so must have comprised the brickworks only and not the associated land. However, the purchase did not go ahead and given his bankruptcy soon afterwards it is likely that he could not raise the money.¹⁵

At the end of the lease, the Davis family were responsible for dilapidations, but the Trustees had to pay for any work done to improve the works and any working plant they wished to purchase. Since 1849 in working the clay resources Davis had driven a water level 105 yards long from the Air Pit to the opening of the level. He had also erected three drying sheds with associated drying stoves. The plant comprised: a pair of (horse) rolls compete with machinery, two clay mills, two iron pumps and pit heads and a winding gin. There were three tile kilns as the dilapidations listed 'three kilns with arches over and side arches.'¹⁶ The working plant shows the lack of mechanisation which would have been typical of a brickyard from this period. The only machine was a brick machine and two pipe machines but these were hand-operated as there was no power plant. In addition, there were brick tables, standings for moulders barrows pipe benches and various moulds all giving the impression of a relatively small-scale works.¹⁷ Davis's valuation was £668 15s. 0d but after much discussion in January 1870 John Daivis of Nedge Farm (not his son E J who ran the works) finally came to an

agreement and the Trustees purchased the fixtures machinery etc. for £350.¹⁸ A few days later the land and brickworks were put up for auction in two lots at the Tontine Hotel however they were not sold. In April Davis was removing materials and making claims for waste tile and stone walling not mentioned in Nevett's Survey.¹⁹

The works seem to have stood idle but in 1872 James C. Perry, Estate Agents enquired about leasing to them on behalf of one of their clients although a small part of the land had been sold off.²⁰ Nothing came of this enquiry however in 1873 George Legge of the adjacent Woodlands Brick and Tile Works purchased the works and some of the land.²¹

The census of 1871 lists Edward J (25) living at Madeley Wood with his wife Mary E. (22) and he is listed in Casey's directory as a Brick, Tile & crest manufacturer. In December 1871 he was declared bankrupt.²² In March 1872 there was to be an auction freehold property including a newly erected brick and tile works late in the occupation of E.J Davis with Shedding kilns, stoves stables and around 5 acres of land possession to be from Lady Day 1872. The auction also included four cottages at Brockholes, two dwelling houses and the Heart of Oak Public House in Court Lane. The houses and pub were probably owned by Davis, but the location of the brickworks is unclear. In 1874 John Edward Davies(sic), a brick and tile maker was in contempt of court for removing a machine that had been taken by the officers of the court and fined £5.²³ By 1879 he had moved to Kenilworth where he set himself up as a maltster and it appears that when he put a notice in the paper stating he was not accountable for the debts of his wife Mary. ²⁴ His father John sold up at the Nedge farm in 1873 and also moved to Kenilworth where in 1881 he was running the Globe Inn.²⁵ Edward John died in 1889 when he was living at 43, Regent Street in Lamington Spa.²⁶

Little is known about the period of Legge's ownership, but from at least 1879 he was advertising himself as running 'The Woodlands and Madeley-Wood Brickworks' and the the OS maps show little or no change to the site between 1882 and 1902.




Figure 4. 25" 1883 OS map Shropshire XLIII.14. The works were run by Legge in *conjunction with that at* Woodlands. He had connected it to the tramway network putting in a link along Harris's Lane presumably to bring in coal and perhaps ship out goods. The Old *Clay Pit has been* absorbed into the Woodlands Works and buildings have been erected. Clay appears to be sourced from a shaft with horse Gin just to the north of the

Willaim John Legge took over the Madeley Wood Company brick and tile works around 1916 when it was sold in an auction.²⁷ By 1927 he had abandoned and largely demolished both the Woodlands and Madeley Wood works and at the latter site only the tile kiln and two buildings are shown. An Aerial photograph of the site in 1930 shows two buildings and the kiln. By 1962 a house called Sunnycrot had been built on the site and the building at the southern end of the site had been demolished. The remaining large building had been converted into a house (No.21 Madeley Road) and the small office was still standing.
